Presenter: Kelly Connor Lewis, Information Systems Specialist for Admissions, The University of Scranton This session introduces Slate.org, a free web-based service that allows high school counselors to view the application status and decisions of their students who have applied to The University of Scranton or other participating colleges and universities using Slate. Other features of Slate.org include the ability to upload materials directly onto student applications and also a free platform for creating and tracking college visits to your school. Slate.org not only saves times and resources but serves to help build stronger relationships between high schools and colleges. As more colleges and universities begin sharing applicant data through Slate.org, we know it will become another valuable resource to help ensure your students are on

track.
